More Information About the Conference Logo

Logo Description: The logo was centred about three concepts based on the writings of Bill White, Sulalewh/Elder, Coast Salish (Snuneymuxw/Cowichan):

- 1) **Protection/guardianship.** This theme showed up in how the ceremonies (songs, dances, rituals, etc.) offered protection to Salish communities. It showed up in how the husband had to prove that he was capable of being a protector to his potential wife, etc. In the realm of sexuality, there is the obvious parallel of the term "protection," but I wanted to allude more to the idea of *community* and practices of well-being (spiritual practices, self-care, a purposeful life, etc.) can allow us protection, and allow us to explore the gifts of sexuality by avoiding its inherent dangers. So, you will see the Thunderbird circling the human face, forming a protective barrier.
- 2) **Transformation through union.** This alludes to the importance of *relationship* in the realm of sexuality. Whether it be health social circles, healthy families, or just healthy couples, our relationships will help us develop a healthy and safe sexual life. So, in the logo, I have the bodies of two Thunderbirds and one human coming together to form a single complete design.
- 3) **Balance.** I used Bill's description of the Thunderbird bringing transformation and the ceremonies intended to keep/restore balance as the basis for the imagery in the logo. Balance, like all areas of human life, is an important aspect of healthy sexuality. So, in the design, I made the logo perfectly symmetrical to allude to concept of balance.

Pre-Conference Resources shared by Bill White, Sulalewh/Elder, Coast Salish (Snuneymuxw/Cowichan):

- Doreen Pelkey from Saanich (married into the Saltwater People) is a significant longhouse leader for the Coast Salish Winter Dancers. She was born in the Stalo Region, Fraser Valley. In this video, she provides significant background about the value of women in Coast Salish culture of her in-laws and her own people. The Stalo and Saanich are both Coast Salish. - The Coast Salish First Nations have retained Spiritual and Cultural knowledge pre- and post-contact. The young people in the video are all adults now. All came from the Victoria and Saanich regions: Agnes Pierre a significant Elder/Sulalewh from Katzie, Dr. Samuel Sam, Tsartip another significant Elder/Sulalewh and former Chief of Songhees, Mr. Robert Sam (nephew of Sam). Greetings!

Thank-you for joining us for the 46th Annual Conference of the Canadian Sex Research Forum in Victoria, British Columbia. With gratitude and respect, I acknowledge that we are holding our meeting on the traditional territories of the Lekwungen and SENĆOŦEN speaking peoples, and the Songhees, Esquimalt, and WSÁNEĆ people who historial relationships with the lands and waters continue to this day. As a leader in the organization, I would like to encourage personal, professional, and organizational reflection on our responsibilities for reconciliation with Indigenous peoples and decolonization. I made a commitment to support more Indigenous content within the conference this year. We will open the conference with a plenary address from Bill White, a Coast Salish (Snuneymuxw/Cowichan) Sulalewh/Elder. On Friday, Dr. Loppie will deliver a plenary address entitled, *Indigenous Sexualities: Sharing Lessons*. Throughout the conference, Bill White will be available to meet, discuss and answer any questions you might have about working with Indigenous communities. I ask you to make the most of these unique opportunities and to reflect about individual and collective roles in more ethical research practice.

CSRF's vision is to be Canada's leading organization fostering sexual science and improving the sexual health and well-being of Canadians. This year we focus on sex and gender, supported by a Canadian Institutes for Health Research Planning and Dissemination Grant awarded to Dr. Sakaluk (CSRF 2019 Local Host). We have three plenaries on these topics: Dr. Bauer on Thursday afternoon on Sex, Gender, and Intersectionality in Sexual Health Research Methods, Dr. Bryson and Dr. Gahagan on Saturday morning on Cancer Knowledge in the Plural: Why Sex and Gender Matter in the Design of Competent Cancer Research & Care, and Dr. Namaste on Saturday afternoon on "Sa w pa konnen pi gran pase w." (That which you do not know exceeds you.) Learning from histories of AIDS in Montréal. On Saturday, we will also have an Invited President's Panel on Sexual Harassment in our Field led by Drs. van Anders, Chivers, and Brotto.

This year we worked to increase the accessibility of the conference. In response to feedback, we made a number of changes: provided the call for abstracts and the online submission system in both English and French; ensured a gender neutral bathroom is available near the main conference room; included people's pronouns in the registration process and on name badges; created a "relaxation room" for anyone at the conference where there is to be no conversations/noises; supported the LGBTQ2+ Caucus to host a public pre-conference social on Wednesday evening and open caucus meeting for any LGBTQ2-identified attendees on Friday afternoon; supported an Accessibility Coordinator and provided accessibility information about the venues online; and fundraised to remove any tickets costs associated with social events. We welcome feedback on these changes and for any advice on how to continue to improve our inclusivity efforts in the future.

Last, thanks to all of the people who helped plan and make this conference possible: presenters who share their work, the Program Committee who reviewed proposals and guided conference planning, session moderators and anonymous student presentation judges, the Executive Council for their oversight, and our Executive Director Lisa Dawn Hamilton who made this all come to life! I would like to personally thank and recognize all of our sponsors. Their support makes the conference possible, especially the student awards and free social events.

Thank you for coming to CSRF 2019. We hope you'll find the meeting both professionally enriching and socially engaging. This is a special opportunity to learn from one another. Please listen carefully, think critically, and engage in respectful constructive dialogue!

After recognizing a need for more LGBTQ2S-centered knowledge, friendly spaces and inclusive events within the CSRF, the LGBTQ2 caucus called for a social event for our communities. With the help and support of the fabulous CSRF local planning committee, Leo Rutherford and Tanille Geib are excited to welcome you to a community event and CSRF's first-ever LGBTQ2S social! The event will include local LGBTQ2S folks and CSRF conference attendees alike, with a common thread of our shared experiences as gender or sexual minority folks. We welcome anyone who identifies as lesbian, gay, bisexual, pansexual, queer, trans(gender), genderqueer, non-binary, Two-spirit, agender, asexual and allies*.

At the event, we will be using an adaption of a game developed through the community mapping lab at the University of Victoria. In small groups, the game prompts folks to share stories about locations and add

these to a shared map. An example is: "tell a story about a place where you felt welcome". In real-time, we will map experiences using google my maps so all attendees can see a visual representation of the stories being shared about safe, affirming, or LGBTQ2S friendly social venues across the country.

In addition to small group conversations, we will be using mentimeter to prompt participation in discussion about social life as an LGBTQ2S person in Canada. Fill out the mentimeter prompts while socializing, drinking or having some snacks! We look forward to being social with you, sharing local venues you might check out while in town and hearing more about your social life!

This event is taking place on the unceded homelands of the Lekwungen-speaking peoples, now known as the Songhees and Esquimalt Nations, whose relationship with the land continues to this day. Acknowledging the territory is a necessary part of reconciliation, and it is important to be mindful of the history of this land, and of the impact colonization has had and continues to have, on the Indigenous people who belong to this land.

Building Entrances

Inn at Laurel Point: The front entrance door is wheelchair accessible. The door is not automatic. There will be an attendant there who can assist with the door if required.

Washrooms
