Speaking about the website, the new website designed by Karen





lucky to have her.



Annual Meeting Update: Kingston, Ontario October 23-25, 2014

#### News from Kingston!

To say that sex research is certainly alive and well in Canada would be an understatement. Based on the overwhelming number of abstract submissions to this year's annual meeting taking place in Kingston, Ontario (October 23-25, 2014 at the Sheraton Four Points Hotel), it would be more appropriate to say that Canadian sex research is flourishing. The Abstract Review committee is busy at work reading the submissions and is tasked with the difficulty of choosing a select number of submissions for paper presentations. This year's meeting will have a larger poster session than in previous years to accommodate the number of submissions and allow for adequate time for paper presentations, discussion, and interaction. Stay tuned at www.canadiansexresearchforum.com in mid June for a preliminary look at the diversity and quality of the presentations at this year's meeting.

On the social front, the Kingston team has been busy at work creating an exciting and enjoyable social program for attendees. There will be two options for our Friday afternoon excursion:

# Option A: Guided trolley and boat tour of historical Kingston.


Enjoy a 75-minute trolley car ride of downtown Kingston, highlighting several of Kingston's attractions including Queen's University, Canada's Royal Military College, Kingston Penitentiary, and Fort Henry, followed by a 90-minute boat cruise of the Thousand Islands region and Kingston's beautiful waterfront. Attractions on the boat cruise include shipwrecks, architecture, and the westerly Thousand Islands. Ticket cost is approximately \$50/person (estimated start time - 1:00 pm, estimated end time - 4:30 pm; there will be a brief break separating activities; start/end time subject to change).

#### **OR Option B: Fort Henry.**

Visit Fort Henry, a fort that was originally built during the War of 1812 and reconstructed between 1832-1837. Fort Henry is a World Heritage Site, and showcases one of the most important collections of British and Canadian military artifacts. Your visit will include an hour-long guided tour of Fort Henry. Ticket and transportation cost is approximately \$35/person (estimated start time 1:00 pm, estimated end time: 3:00 pm; start/end time subject to change).

Our Friday night social event will be a cocktail party featuring light appetizers, a cash bar, and plenty of opportunities to socialize! Estimated ticket cost is \$25 for CSRF members, \$40 for non-members (estimated start time – 6:30 pm, estimated end time – 8:30 pm; start/end times subject to change). We hope to see you all there!





## News from Paul Vasey's Laboratory of Comparative Sexuality at the University of Lethbridge

- Paul Vasey appeared in a CBC Nature of Things documentary, Survival of the Fabulous, discussing his Samoan research on the evolution of male androphilia. Interviews with Paul were broadcast on CBC Radio and Savage Lovecast. An extended interview about his research was posted on the website of UCLA's Foundation for Psychocultural Research. Paul was invited by Anne Perkins (famous for her research on "gay" rams) to give a talk about his work on Japanese macaque sexuality at Carroll College in Helena, Montana. He attended the World Professional Association of Transgender Health meeting in Bangkok where he presented a paper coauthored with Doug VanderLaan and Lanna Petterson on sexual orientation and childhood separation anxiety. He also attended the Moving Trans\* History Forward Symposium organized by Aaron Devor at the University of Victoria. Paul was appointed to the Editorial Board of the Canadian Journal of Human Sexuality.
- **Jean-Baptiste (JB) Leca, Noëlle Gunst** and **Paul Vasey** obtained funding from the *American Institute of Bisexuality* to study male bisexual behavior in mona monkeys in Grenada, where JB and Noelle completed two months of fieldwork. JB appeared on Grenadian television discussing our mona monkey research. JB also appeared in the theatrical release of the documentary, *Survival of the Fabulous*, discussing our research on male homosexual behavior in Japanese macaques.
- Lanna Petterson completed fieldwork in Samoa where she is studying male bisexuality using a viewing time paradigm.
- Scott Semenyna joined the lab in January as an MSc student and will be studying cross-cultural aspects of bullying in relation to sexual orientation. He obtained a SSHRC Joseph-Armand Bombardier Canada Graduate Scholarship to conduct this work.
- Emma Yong successfully completed her Honours thesis "Childhood Cross-Gender Wishes and their Association with Sexual Orientation in Japanese Men."
- Our research was covered in a BBC News Magazine article entitled The Evolutionary Puzzle of Homosexuality.
- The Vasey lab moved to their newly renovated space in the Dr. Foster James Penny Building in downtown Lethbridge.

### Featured Student Profiles: Chelsea Kilimnik, Léa Seguin, and Silvain Dang

In the recent past, the student section of the newsletter has featured a very successful 'Where are they now' series which explored how CSRF has contributed to the careers and professional development of past student members through an interview with past CSRF Student Award winners. In order to keep things fresh, we thought it would be a great idea to begin featuring a few student and faculty members in the upcoming newsletters to allow everyone to get to know our members a little bit better! This is a great opportunity to put faces to names, as well as to learn more about the fascinating research our members are doing across the country! Enjoy!

Chelsea Kilimnik completed her Honors BA at the University of Winnipeg under the supervision of Dr. Paul Trapnell in June 2012. She felt isolated from the sex research community in Winnipeg and joined CSRF to connect with other sex researchers. She wrote her undergraduate thesis on the subjective identification effects of sexual assault on affectivity and sensitivity to threat cues, which she presented at the CSRF 2012 conference in Ottawa. At the conference, she met her current supervisor Dr. Terry Humphreys from Trent University, and applied to work with him the following year. Chelsea is currently conducting her MSc thesis research on the effects of nonconsensual sexual experiences on sexual consent perspectives and affective sexual adjustment. With her research partner Raymond McKie, she is working on a

study of incarcerated sexual offenders' perspectives of sexual consent and boundary negotiation in collaboration with the Central East Correctional Centre (CECC) in Ontario under the supervision of Dr. Humphreys. She has an upcoming presentation at the Guelph Sexuality Conference on the impact of postsecondary sex education on the use and attitudes toward sexually explicit material. Chelsea, Raymond, and Dr. Humphreys are also currently preparing a manuscript on the impact of post-secondary sex education on sexual knowledge, attitudes, and behaviours. Chelsea's main areas of interest are in post-sexual assault sexual adjustment, sexual consent, sexual coercion and victimization, and sex offenders.


#### Featured Student Profiles: Chelsea Kilimnik, Léa Seguin, and Silvain Dang



Léa Seguin l'Université du Québec à Montréal

Léa Seguin first attended the University of Ottawa where, for the completion of her undergraduate thesis under the supervision of Elke Reissing, she studied the influence of bisexual women's past sexual and romantic experience on men's attitudes. Afterwards, as a Master's student, she worked with Robin Milhausen at the University of Guelph, where she conducted research on individuals' motives for pretending orgasm and their related sexual and relationship outcomes. In the fall of 2014, she will be pursuing doctoral studies at l'Université du Québec à Montréal with Martin Blais, where she plans to conduct research on the sexual and relationship outcomes of men and women's sexual motives in the context of consensual non-monogamy. Léa recently submitted an article for review to the Canadian Journal of Human Sexuality on the development and validation of the Motives for Feigning Orgasms Scale (MOFO), and presented a poster detailing a part of this research at the annual Canadian Sex Research Forum last fall. She is currently working on two other manuscripts about the impact of motives for pretending orgasm on men's and women's desire and satisfaction.

Silvain Dang completed his BSc in 2011 at the University of British Columbia under the supervision of Dr. Boris Gorzalka. His undergraduate work culminated in a presentation at CSRF 2011 on the role of the endocannabinoid system in regulating female sexual arousal. He has continued to work with Dr. Gorzalka for his MA thesis on the effects of chronic adolescent cannabinoid exposure on adult sexual behaviours in male and female rats. At the same time, he conducted research on the roles of attachment style, acculturation, and sexual beliefs on sexuality in men and women. He will be starting doctoral studies in September of 2014, where he will continue to examine the role of both biological and psychosocial factors, and how they may interact, in the development of sexual variation and dysfunctions for both human and animal models. Silvain is currently preparing his MA thesis for submission and publication, and is also working on two additional manuscripts on the interrelation of attachment style, culture, and sexual functioning.

## Featured Faculty/Professional Profiles: Emily Impett, Laurie Betito, and Lucia O'Sullivan



Emily Impett University of Toronto Mississauga

**Emily Impett** is an Assistant Professor of Psychology at the University of Toronto Mississauga (UTM), where she has been since joining the faculty in 2010. Emily got her PhD in Social Psychology at the University of California, Los Angeles in 2004, after which she conducted a postdoctoral fellowship at the Center for Research on Gender and Sexuality at San Francisco State University and a postdoctoral fellowship in the Department of Psychology at the University of California, Berkeley. Emily's research focuses on topics and questions at the interface of sexuality and close relationships. She is interested in such questions as: Why do people have sex? Why do people have sex when they are not in the mood? And what are the personal and relationship consequences of engaging in sexual sacrifice? Emily is the director of the Relationships and Well-Being Lab at UTM, and the founder of the Toronto Relationships Interest Group (TRIG). She has been awarded grants from the SSHRC, CIHR (with Natalie Rosen), CFI, the Connaught Foundation, and NIH, and has published over 50 empirical articles and chapters on sexuality and relationships. She serves as a Consulting Editor for four journals, including the Journal of Personality and Social Psychology, Personality and Social Psychology Bulletin, Personal Relationships, and the Canadian Journal of Human Sexuality. She was recently awarded the Gerald R. Miller Award for Early Career Achievement from the International Association for Relationship Research, an Early Researcher Award (ERA) from the Ontario Ministry of Research and Innovation, and along with her postdoctoral fellow, Amy Muise, a 5-year SSHRC Insight Grant to study sexual decision-making processes in long-term romantic relationships. She lives in downtown Toronto with her husband and two kids, Dmitri (6) and Nikolai (4). They love to travel around the world hearing Emily talk about sexuality and relationships, and will join her this summer in Dubrovnik, Croatia where she will give an invited oral plenary talk at the International Academy of Sex Research on how people can navigate desirediscrepant sexual situations in ways that are beneficial for both partners in romantic relationships.



## Featured Faculty/Professional Profiles: Emily Impett, Laurie Betito, and Lucia O'Sullivan



Laurie Betito Clinical Psychologist and Sex Therapist

**Dr. Laurie Betito** is a clinical Psychologist and Sex therapist who has been a member of CSRF since her student days going way back to the early 1990's. She is also a past president of CSRF. Laurie is affiliated with the Montreal General Hospital's Human Sexuality Unit, directed by Dr. Pierre Assalian. Laurie is known mostly for her work in media. For the last 23 years she has been on the radio, dispensing sex and relationship advice. For the last 15 of those years, she has been on the air every weeknight in Montreal (www.cjad.com) with her show, Passion, from 10 to 11pm. Dr. Laurie has also done quite a bit of television, having hosted her own show, as well as being the "sexpert" on various programs and documentaries. Along with her private practice and her radio work, Laurie devotes some of her time to community projects. Presently, she is the President of the Sexual Health Network of Quebec (formerly Planned Parenthood Montreal) where she works with a team of people to fundraise and advocate for sex education into Quebec schools. This summer, Dr. Laurie is taking a group of university students on a humanitarian mission to Thailand to work with an NGO combating sex tourism/trafficking. Most recently, Laurie has authored a book which is due out this summer—The Sex Bible for People over 50—published by Quayside Publishing Group. On a personal note, Dr. Laurie has been married for 20 years and is the mother of two daughters, 16 and 18. Laurie can be reached at www.drlaurie.com

Lucia O'Sullivan is a social psychologist, a Professor of Psychology at the University of New Brunswick, and holds a Canada Research Chair in Adolescents' Sexual Health Behaviour. She has a Master's degree in Clinical Psychology, but realized quickly she was meant only to be a researcher in life and so completed her Ph.D. in Experimental Psychology. In 1998, she accepted a faculty position at Columbia University in New York after completing a postdoc in HIV, and led a research program there for 11 years on sexual risk behaviour among adolescents and young adults. Her research focuses primarily on sexual health, intimate relationships, and sexual decision-making. Other studies address the development of romantic and sexual relationships, sexual coercion and compliance, and the role of gender in romantic and sexual relationship experiences. Her research program frequently incorporates studies and collaborations that are international (e.g., South Africa, Guatemala, India, US, UK), interdisciplinary and health focused. However, her all-time favourite studies are those that she conducts with her graduate and undergraduate students. Some of the topics that they have studied lately addressed infidelity in dating relationships, content analyses of free online porn, break-ups, the impact of technology use on intimacy, stalking and cyberstalking. She serves on the editorial boards of eight journals, has published over 75 peer-reviewed articles, many chapters, and one edited book. She also loves to teach and has twice won the Outstanding Teacher Award at Teachers College, Columbia University, and the Allan P. Stuart Award for Excellent in Teaching from The University of New Brunswick, as well as other awards for her research. She has been awarded over \$9,000,000 in grants from private and federal sources, and has developed a strong research team of graduate students specializing in sexual behaviour and the intimate relationships of adolescents and young adults. She lives in Fredericton with her husband and two kids, Madeline (5) and Jack (7). They love to hike to waterfalls, downhill ski, camp, take road trips based on locations of great restaurants, and play with their two adorable pet rats.
