

THE STUDENT SCENE......

For this edition of the Student Scene, we would like to turn the spotlight on one of our award winning student CSRF members, **Tuuli Kukkonen** whom we (Kelly, Lisa and Erin) interviewed for this piece:

Interviewer: Please tell us a little about your background, including where you grew up, where you completed your prior degree(s), where you are working on your current degree, and what your research has focused on.

Tuuli: I was born in Finland, and I grew up in Montreal. I completed a Bachelors of Arts (honors) degree in Psychology at Concordia University, Montreal, Quebec. Currently, I am in the 4th year of my Ph.D. studies in Clinical Psychology at McGill University, Montreal, Quebec under the supervision of Dr. Irv Binik. My research has focused on the measurement of sexual arousal in men and women.

Interviewer: How did you become interested in sex research?

Tuulii: I was first introduced to the field of sex research when working as a research assistant for Dr. Binik and immediately became fascinated with the variety of issues and controversies requiring scientific investigation.

Interviewer: What study are you currently running?

Tuuli: I am currently running the thermography study in an older population to determine whether our initial findings from a student population are generalizable.

Interviewer: What study do you plan to run next?

Tuuli: We are about to start a study comparing thermography to penile ultrasound, the current gold standard in the assessment of erectile dysfunction.

Interviewer: What are your future career goals?

Tuuli: The continued pursuit of enhancing knowledge and understanding of sexuality.

Summary of the 32nd Annual CSRF Conference (From the Perspective of the Current CSRF Student Representatives)

On September 28-30, 2006, the 32nd annual CSRF Conference took place in our nation's capital city. Researchers, clinicians, and students gathered from several disciplines and from across the country to participate. The conference started out with a fabulous panel delivered by Dr. Peggy Kleinplatz and her colleagues. Speaking on their research that examines optimal sexuality and "great sex," these talks were refreshing and optimistic, and were a wonderful way to start the conference!

The talks that followed over the next few days were equally engaging. From a student perspective, it was great to see several students present their research. Students presented on topics ranging from sex stores and their role in sex education, to the missing prostitutes of Vancouver. From the many wonderful student presentations, judges for the 2006 CSRF Student Paper Award had the difficult job of choosing a winner. However, two talks were particularly striking, and two well-deserved awards were presented for the Best Student Paper. Both Tuuli Kukkonen, BA, and Deanne Simms, BA were the recipients of this award. Tuuli presented exciting data on thermal imaging of sexual arousal in both men and women (see the feature of Tuuli in the current newsletter), and Deanne presented on gender differences in sexual satisfaction in dating partners. High-caliber research such as that presented by Tuuli and Deanne bodes well for the future of sexuality research in Canada, and highlights the excellent work that is currently being conducted in sexuality within our country.

In addition to the excellent presentations and conference discussions, the 33rd annual forum also allowed for good networking opportunities and hosted great social events. The first day of the conference was followed by a night of food and fun at one of Ottawa's Byward Market pubs, and Friday night dinner even included belly dancers! All in all, this was a fun, engaging, and very successful conference. We look forward to the next one, and to learning more about the sexuality work that is being conducted across the country. See you all in Banff in 2007!

FEATURING.....Paul Federoff, M.D.

Originally from Saskatoon (who knew?), Paul received his B.A. in psychology and M.D. from the University of Saskatchewan. After completing an internship in medicine and surgery he worked for a year in Northern Saskatchewan as a family physician. He then moved to Baltimore where he complete his residency and then fellowship in Psychiatry and Neuropsychiatry at the Johns Hopkins Hospital. It was during this time that he fell under the mentorship of Professor John Money, the originator of the concept of lovemaps to explain paraphilic sexual disorders.

Paul is an Associate Professor of Psychiatry at the University of Ottawa. He holds appointments in both the Department of Criminology and the Department of Psychiatry. He is also Director of Research at the Forensic Unit of the University of Ottawa Institute of Mental Health Research and a staff psychiatrist at the Royal Ottawa Health Care Group and Ottawa Civic Hospital. He is a member of 20 different professional organizations, and we're certainly pleased that CSRF is one of them. He is the author or co-author on more than 40 journal articles and 14 book chapters, mostly on topics related to sexual offenders, and has received numerous grants to support his research. He has a special interest in unusual paraphilias and in people with intellectual disability and problematic sexual behaviors. Paul certainly is recognized internationally as an expert in his field and thus is frequently asked to give invited and keynote addresses. In fact, he gave 14 invited talks in 2006 alone! He is also sought after by the media for interviews on topics such as sex offender notification, pedophilia, the treatment of sex offenders, child pornography, fetishes, and sadomasochism, to name just a few. Before moving to Ottawa, he spent 10 years at the Clarke Institute and the University of Toronto.

Paul has been a member of CSRF for at least 10 years. He will be our keynote speaker at the 2007 meeting in Banff speaking on *The Long and Winding Road: How the Concept of Love-maps Has Changed*. This is not the first time that Paul has been an invited speaker at CSRF. In 1996, he gave an invited academic lecture entitled *What is New in Paraphilia Research?* We also have heard him talk about *Paraphilias and the Insanity Defense*. So some of us already know that Paul really is an expert, has interesting ideas and raises thought-provoking questions, and is an excellent speaker. We're fortunate that he's agreed to share his ideas with us again. Upcoming Guelph Sexuality Conference to Focus on Human Rights

The 29th Annual Guelph Sexuality Conference is scheduled for June 18-20, 2007 at the University of Guelph. This year's theme is Sexual Health and Human Rights. Keynote speakers include CSRF member Eleanor Maticka Tyndale, Canada Research Chair in Social Justice and Sexual Health at the University of Windsor as well as Diane Di Mauro from the Mailman School of Public Health, Columbia University. Noted civil rights lawyer and Osgoode Hall law professor Alan Young will also be speaking at the conference. Young will be part of a team that will bring two Charter of Rights and Freedoms challenges concerning the rights of sex workers before the Superior Court of Justice of Ontario in March or April. Says



Young, "We are going to challenge three provisions that create problems for sex trade workers."

How About a Little Hokey Pokey?

A Hamilton, Ontario high school has become one of the first in Canada to officially ban "grinding" at high school dances. Banning the sexually provocative dance style from the gymnasium floor has become increasingly popular south of the border. What exactly is grinding? According to Gene Connolly, principle at a Concord New Hampshire high school, grinding is "feigning a sex act. The girl leans forward and the boy puts his pelvis against her backside. Then he thrusts." Principle Connolly added that "this type of dancing is wrong". Students attending dances at Pacific Grove High School in Pacific Grove California are required to sign a "Dance Contract" in order to gain entrance to the gym. The contract specifies that there is to be no grinding, "making out" or other inappropriate touching. Students are to keep both feet on the floor at all times and hands must be on the waist or shoulders only. The contract warns that "If too many couples are dancing inappropriately, the lights will be turned on and/or music changed as a collective warning for everyone. A verbal warning will be made on the microphone". St. Frances High School in Athol Springs New York goes a step farther by banning music at the dances that contain "intense heavy bass lines" because this invariably leads to sexually provocative dancing. Finally, Gig Harbor, Washington high school Principal Greg Schellenberg has threatened to cancel this spring's junior and senior proms because he was forced to shut down a recent dance because of sexually suggestive dancing. Principal Schellenberg realized he had lost control of the proceedings when some dancers persisted in interlocking their legs and grinding their hips even after he had asked them to stop and had attempted to change the mood by playing the "Hokey Pokey". I'm not making this up! Some have wondered what all the hoopla is about, astutely noting that this grinding is very similar to many of the dance moves portrayed in the classic 1987 movie *Dirty Dancing*, a film that many boomer era CSRF members may have more than a passing familiarity with.



CSRF Bylaws: An Update Regarding the Updates


